## Structure, Governance and Management

The Platelet Society is constituted as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation registered with the Charity Commission in August 2017 under the charity number 1172202.

## **Organisational Structure**

The charity has a Board of Trustees which are responsible for the governance of the charity. The Trustees set up a management committee that are responsible for enacting strategies that allow the Charity to fulfil is key objectives.

#### Trustees

The charity was established with five Trustees (Matthew Harper, Paul Harrison, Sarah Jones, June May and Stephen Watson). June May resigned in 2017 and the Trustees are currently seeking a replacement. All Trustees give their time voluntarily and receive no benefits from the Charity. Any expenses reclaimed from the Charity are set out in the accounts.

When the Society was founded, a panel of Trustees were appointed to serve different periods of time in order to ensure that there would be continuity of service. Stephen Watson would serve for four years, Paul Harrison would serve for three years, June May (resigned), Sarah Jones and Matthew Harper would serve for two years. All new members of Trustees beyond this initial group would serve for a period of three years after which they must be re-elected at the next Annual General Meeting.

To enhance the potential pool of Trustees, the Charity has through networking sought to identify individuals who would be willing to become trustees and use their own experience to assist the Charity. The Trustees wish to recruit an individual from a non-research active background to provide broader experience of the charity sector and act as Chair of Trustees.

## **Management Committee**

At present the Committee has seven members with research backgrounds relevant to the work of the Charity, who were elected to represent different stages of the academic career track. We have made strong efforts to ensure that the composition of the committee is diverse and represents our membership by inclusion of male and female researchers, and early career researchers. The Management Committee meets bimonthly and are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the Society. The Committee is focused on facilitating participation of the research community through the Society webpage, supporting conference organisation and outreach activities.

Committee members are elected to serve for a period of three years after which they must be reelected at the next Annual General Meeting.

## **Risk Management**

The Trustees and Management Committee have reviewed the major risks to which the Charity may be exposed, and appropriate systems have been implemented to mitigate risk. In particular, risks to external funding have led to the development of a plan which allows ring fencing for funding for core activities. All medical related information provided on our website is general and is covered by a specific medical disclaimer policy. Structures have been put in place to account for recent changes in General Data Protection Regulations. The Trustees are satisfied that arrangements are in place to manage risks that have been identified.

#### **Our Aims**

Our Society's purpose is to promote excellence in research, education and public awareness of platelet biology in human health and disease.

To ensure that we remain focussed on our key aims they are appraised on a yearly basis in order to review both what we have achieved and evaluate the outcome of our work. The review examines the success of each key activity to ensure that they benefit the groups that hope to serve.

#### The Focus of our Work

Our main objectives for the year were focussed on establishing the Society within the research community and create a number of activities and structures that would help promote our key aims in the future. The strategies we used to meet these objectives were:

- To facilitate greater communication within the research community
- To continue to support and develop academic conferences in the area of platelet biology
- To provide the public with accessible information on platelet related diseases
- To improve public understanding of platelet biology

## **Activities and Achievements**

## How our activities deliver public benefit

The Society carries out a number of activities in pursuance of its aims. These activities, summarised below, provide benefit to members of the Society and wider society.

## To facilitate greater communication within research community

A key element of the creation of the Platelet Society was to create a stronger network of biomedical researchers and clinicians with interests in platelet biology.

- **i. Website.** In our first year the Society has launched a new website that caters both for the research community and the wider public. <a href="https://plateletsociety.co.uk/">https://plateletsociety.co.uk/</a> The new website provides information of upcoming conferences, key research findings from around the world, information on available PhD studentships and research positions.
- **ii. Newsletter.** We have developed a newsletter designed with a more community focus that updates the membership on recent research meetings, graduation of PhD students and promotions of our members.

To continue to support and develop academic conferences in the area of platelet biology Scientific conferences are a corner stone of academic endeavour that facilitates a valuable exchange of new ideas and methods. We have begun to make changes to our programme of conferences:

- i. Early Career Researchers (ECR) Meeting. We have initiated a biannual Early Career Researchers Meeting to help develop a wider skills base within our community. This meeting was developed to allow junior researchers the opportunity to gain valuable experience in conference organisation and for the wider junior research community opportunities to develop their own collaborations and networks independently of their academic supervisors. In 2018 we successfully organised and delivered our first ECR meeting at Manchester Metropolitan University.
- **ii.** Reorganisation of meetings. The research community wished to maximize opportunities for the membership to meet, network and develop its own identity. We have proposed that from 2021 the Society begins to host an annual meeting. The current separate meetings, the Platelet Society Meeting and the Early Career Researchers meeting, which are currently held on alternate years, will be merged and take place over two nights with an Annual General Meeting (AGM) of the Society included in the programme.
- **iii. Specialist workshops.** As part of our remit of promoting the best quality scientific research in platelet biology we have begun to organise specialist workshops that provide training in important

aspects of the field. This year we held a workshop (hosted by the University of Cambridge) for a limited number of basic scientists focusing on the use of Transcriptomics and Genomics in platelet research.

## To provide the public with accessible information on platelet related diseases

The Society does not provide medical advice and when contacted by individuals seeking such advice directs to the clinician(s) involved in their care pathway. However, the society does provide a number of fact sheets on the role of platelets in health and disease and platelet related diseases. We also provide a number of personal perspectives of patients who live with platelet related diseases to raise awareness of the individual suffers cope with their particular disorders.

## To improve public understanding of platelet biology

As part of our mission to improve the public understanding of blood platelets and their roles in health and disease our members engage in a number of outreach activities. These activities are undertaken by our members at the local level often in collaboration with their host university and other outside bodies. One example is the Skirting Science event organised at the University of Bristol in collaboration with Soroptimist International to inspire the next generation of female scientists. In addition, the Society has established a presence of social media platforms including Twitter and Facebook to further promote our public engagement activities.

#### **Plans for Future Period**

The Society plans to continue the activities outlined above in the coming years subject to a satisfactory funding position, but also expand the activities into other areas.

- We wish to broaden the experience and skills base of the Trustees. In particular, we will look to recruit and appoint a new Chair of Trustees from the non-research active sector.
- We will continue to enhance our scientific conferences. Our immediate focus will be to support the Platelet Society Conference in 2019 and the Early Career Researchers Meeting in 2020 as the last independent conferences in their current formats. We will also begin to plan for the merging of these meeting into the new format annual meeting in 2021.
- We will hold our first Annual General Meeting in 2019 at which point we will hold elections for positions as a Trustee and for membership of the Management Committee.
- We will look to expand the expertise through the formation of a Medical Committee. This will be
  populated by clinicians and clinical scientists who have direct experience on working with platelet
  related diseases.
- Stronger links with other Societies.

## **Financial Review**

The Society currently holds a total funds of £6,963, which is more than sufficient to meet its operating costs for the coming year. There is an additional £12,000 generated from the UK Platelet Meeting held in 2017; at the time of tis report, this income is currently being processed. The Society has no long-term investments, with the cash reserves held in our deposit account.

## Principal source of funding

At present the charity has four potential income streams including membership fees, organisation of conferences, dedicated fundraising activities and public donations. The membership fees and funds raised through conference organisation are still the major sources of income.

#### Reserves

The Management Committee has examined the Charity's key objectives for the coming years and planned a reserves policy accordingly. Our membership feels strongly that the delivery of the Platelet Society scientific conference is a critical event for the research and wider community. Consequently, the committee has established a policy whereby income from conferences is ring fenced and held to support future conferences should sponsorship become limited in the future.
